They answered their questions and had an amazing experience getting to know many young people from many different walks of life.

.... a word from Margaret....

As we come to the end of the year, I give thanks for all our members in Vocations Ireland, and your commitment to Religious Life today. Many of you have supported and encouraged me during this year. It has probably been the toughest year I have experienced since I began but it has also been a very blessed year.

I was sad to lose two very important colleagues with whom I have worked very closely over the years. Sr Peggy McLoughlin from the Sisters of St Joseph of Cluny and Sr Frances Kelly from the Sisters of Nazareth who passed away very quickly. Both of these women were committed to their congregations and to vocation ministry and were great examples of religious life. I learned much from them through their witness, joy, hope, and love of religious life. May they rest in peace.

In the past year, we closed our doors as Vocations Ireland Charity and opened them as a committee of AMRI. This of course involved physical moving, financial movement of accounts, setting up a new office and becoming part of a new team.

We also had to tend with Covid and the fall out with the difficulties that it brought to everyone's door. Many congregations sadly lost members of their communities, family members and friends. We had to dig deep and find new ways of doing things, new ways of connecting, new ways of being challenged and of challenging others.

July arrived and the doors were flung open once again and we tried to re connect. I was extremely busy July, August, September, and October. I visited some communities looking for help in preparation for the Ploughing Championships. Our Contemplative sisters were wonderful. They helped me delete old addresses on our prayer cards, so we did not waste them. They produced the bags of salt with the prayer cards for giving out at the ploughing. Both of these jobs were tedious, yet done with such a spirit of love and joy. Some of the communities took photographs of their eco-friendly gardens which I have used at the ploughing and at other smaller events. We have some very gifted photographers in our communities. We had a wonderful Conference for our Religious Brothers held in Mount St Annes with Br Pinto from India as the guest speaker. We celebrated the gift of brotherhood and with confidence we look forward to growing the understanding of this vocation today.

We held our Orientation Workshop for new and returning vocation directors, formators and leaders. While the numbers attending was very disappointing, I was enthused and excited by those who did attend. This group was one of the youngest groups I have had for training and hopefully will bring new life to Vocation Promotion.

We also had our National Conference which again was poorly attended with only 42 compared to normal numbers of between 80 and 100.

We have evaluated these drops in numbers and the reasons that appear to be coming up are.

1. Covid - some are still nervous of attending in person events
2. Everything was reopening and events were at that time being held too close together.
3. Chapters were delayed due to covid and many felt they would no longer be in their current role and therefore did not attend.

I will be putting out a calendar early in the new year of possible events. I will be trying to get a sense of whether you want live or online events. We are not currently in a financial position to offer Hybrid events as we need professional equipment and expertise to run such events. Some of us in AMRI are looking into this possibility for the future.

We also faced a huge difficulty in getting a venue as most retreat/conference centres are closed and hotel prices have shot up. We will need to look carefully at this issue for next year.

Currently the only places on offer are Mount St Anne's and Maynooth Conference Centre. If anyone knows of any other venues that could be a possibility, please let me know.

Last year our Vocation Music Awards was a great success despite it having to be done online. This proved to be very difficult and time consuming but thankfully we had Helena Connolly working in AMRI at the time who provided us with her superb talent and expertise. This year we have put together a recording of the top 10 winners and we hope to launch this at CYMFed Flame event in Wembley early next year. We will put this on our YouTube channel and a C.D. will be presented to the congregations who contributed financially to the Awards.

The Executive finished the year with three days in Roscrea praying together and reflecting on our new Mission and Goals for the future in tandem with AMRI's goals. I am looking forward in 2023 to working with Vocations Ireland in AMRI, bringing Vocations out from behind doors and encouraging our young people and our religious to engage with one another to seek new and vibrant ways of living religious life today.

May I wish you all a blessed Advent as we prepare for the arrival of the Christ Child and a very happy Christmas which I hope is a restful and peaceful one for all.
