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THIS LENT, LOOK AROUND

Sr. Deborah Borneman National Religious Vocation Conference Chicago



Look around this Lent and see what catches your attention. Have you noticed any nuances that invite you to look closer? Recently I was scrolling through social media, and I casually glanced at this fun fact: "The bee lives less than 40 days, visits at least 1,000 flowers, and produces less than a teaspoon of honey. Is it worth it?" This two-sentence post prompted me to inquire further to fact-check lifespans, and I found out that it depends upon the type of bee and when they are born! According to Buzz About Bees, there are honey bees (also known as the worker bees), bumble bees, and queen bees. They are different in appearance, lifespans, and pollination abilities. Additionally, I learned that bees born in the autumn live longer than those born in the spring or summer because of the varying workloads. This quick statistic reminds me of giving vocation panel presentations on religious life. For example, if the vocation director is a monastic or a missionary, some of their answers will vary. Likewise, insights about formation experiences will be different depending on entrance dates. Furthermore, there's a distinction between charisms that cannot be generalized on a bumper sticker, there's a difference between when and how we gather for communal prayer, there are variations on how we live the vows, how we choose to dress, and certainly, there's plenty of opinions about the future of religious life! If women and men continue to respond to God's call throughout their lives (versus a one-time decision), instead of watching the proverbial sand spiralling down in a fragile hourglass, look around to notice the Spirit beckoning us to the beach and places where the sand is deep and wide. What you see depends upon what you spend time looking for. Perhaps Lent can be a 40-day invitation to choose to look around longer, higher, deeper, and wider. This Lent, look around for... Music that breathes through your soul to enliven your Spirit. Longer pauses throughout the day to hear God calling you by name. Higher ongoing formation through podcasts, videos, books, and poetry. Deeper understanding of the timeless vows we live in the 21st century. Wider conversations with people who help you to dream, disagree, and discern. Looking around can enlarge vision rather than diminish it. Looking around purposefully rather than randomly can inspire weary souls to recognize that God continues to call even when we stop responding. Looking around requires movement beyond sitting still, it invites curiosity instead of complacency. When we take the time to look around, we can recognize Christ dwelling in our hearts, rooted, and grounded in love, and have the strength to comprehend the breadth, length, height, and depth of the love of God for each of us (Ephesians 3:18-21). There's been a lot of chatter about intentionally slowing down, yet if we look at a bee's lifespan, it's all about purposeful productivity, isn't it? That's a deeper calling, to discern choices in what is best for the person making the decision or what brings life to the community. "One bee, less than a teaspoon of honey. Is it worth it?" While I do not understand much about the minds of bees, I am convinced a bee does not value its worth by the honey produced or count the flowers visited each day. Yet at least 1,000 flowers are pollinated because of one bee's lifetime. Looking around may take us away from counting members to appreciating the countless lives touched by each person in our communities. As we continue our Lenten journey, let us also continue to look around.

Perhaps some of you could plan ahead to bring some young people to the Mass as well as invite members of your communities to attend. It would be lovely to have people attend from all over the country. One idea would be to organise a pilgrimage to pray for the culture of vocation at the vocation Mass and have the opportunity to meet Religious of all ages and hear their stories.

- ❖ We also discussed how we might support those in vocation ministry which can be a lonely place at times especially if you have no team with you.
